#### 2.3.4. Student: Mentor Ratio (preceding academic year)

#### **Mentoring system**

All the students of dental college (undergraduates and postgraduates) are allotted to mentors to monitor the progress of the students. The 1<sub>st</sub> and 2<sub>nd</sub> year undergraduate students are allotted to medical subject teaching staff, 3<sub>rd</sub> and 4<sub>th</sub> year undergraduate students are under dental subject teachers. Mentors of postgraduate students are their subject guides themselves.

10-15 students are given to each staff, a meeting between the mentors and mentees are called upon to obtain their internal assessment marks and attendance in every subject to monitor their progress and regularity to college. Personal details of the students like parents/guardians full address ,email ids and phone numbers, so that the progress of their ward can be posted to them and informed regarding their backlog subjects, extra classes to compensate for the shortage in attendance and extra tests to improve their academic performance.

Once the information of attendance % and internal assessment marks of all students are obtained, the same have to be mailed to a common email id of the chairperson of the committee to maintain a database of the same. All the mentors are called for a meeting once in two months, they are asked to identify students who require academic assistance, and their parents are emailed / personally called to college to inform about their wards performance.

Measures which are taken to improve their performance in academics are additional internal assessments and viva voces to improve internal assessment marks, methods to face viva voce for anxious students, written mock tests with the pattern of final examinations for students who are finding subjects difficult to cope with, extra classes for the difficult topics or topics that the students are finding difficulty in. Students who require counseling are identified and sent for counseling outside college and after college hours

The cut off 75% attendance in every subject is mandatory to write the final exams. There are some students who have shortage in attendance, such students have to be identified by their mentors, and parents are informed. Classes can be compensated by the students who are having genuine reasons for shortage in attendance

by attending college during their holidays with the junior batches.

# 3.2.1 The Institution has created an ecosystem for innovations including Incubation Centre and other initiatives for creation and transfer of knowledge



# 3.4.2 Number of students participating in extension and outreach activities during the year

- The institution conducts NSS activities by organizing screening and oral health education camps; the 3<sup>rd</sup> & 4th year under-graduate students, interns along with the respective teacher in-charge conduct these programs at various places in and around Bengaluru.
- Active participation in Pulse Polio Immunisation programs and Chikungunya awareness programs.

  Government schools are also targeted for screening by the Arogya Mission program Organized by BBMP Cholanagar.
- Faculty members, under- and postgraduate students participates in extension activities such as Multi-media based health education, screening and health education and Health care service programs.
- The institution provides services using the mobile dental clinic, which ensures rendering of extension services in remote areas.
- 8 The institution actively participates in National programs like: Republic day.
- International days are also celebrated by conducting awareness drives for the society like Antitobacco day, Oral Hygiene Day etc.

# **3.4.3** Number of awards and recognitions received for extension and outreach activities from Government / other recognised bodies during the year

The institution has received several letters of appreciation and mementos from the local organizations (Rotary Club, Lions Club, Bawa Foundation, Karnataka Cancer Society, Central Bureau of Investigation CBI, Mother Dairy, CRPF, Border Security Forces, etc.) who had invited the institution to conduct the extension activities, following the completion of the oral health camps. Appreciation letters have been received from all the camps conducted so far.

# 3.4.4 Institutional social responsibility activities in the neighbourhood community in terms of education, environmental issues like Swachh Bharath, health and hygiene awareness and socio-economic development issues carried out by the students and staff during the year.

The college has established committee for extension activities and institutional social responsibilities. In this committee students, faculties are members. A full time faculty is designated as extension officer. Numerous activities regarding health care, blood donation, citizenship role, environment and swatch Bharat activities are initiated. The community is sensitized regarding women empowerment, domestic violence, female feticide and such other issues. Free of cost treatment is provided to all patients in dental camps through the mobile dental unit. Every type of dental therapeutic care the

patient requires including outpatient treatment and hospitalization if necessary is provided with nominal charges through the submission of camp referral cards. In accordance with the principle of providing free incremental dental care to children, the department of Public Health Dentistry has adopted schools in the neighboring areas. The students are screened and appropriate dental care is provided. They are then regularly checked and incremental care is provided to the children requiring treatment. The various schools adopted by the department of Public health dentistry are: Kodigehalli Government School, Ashraya English School, Hebbal, Mamatha High School, Cholanagar, IQRA Nursery and Primary School, R.T Nagar. The Department of Public Health Dentistry has also adopted Imdad-E-Nisa Trust, Fraser Town, an old age home which takes care of the welfare of women.

Also, there is mobile dental van of institution. This enhances extension activities of the Institution and benefits the community such that population living in remote and inaccessible areas of the district gets access to oral health education, screening and care. The Department of Public Health Dentistry has conducted extensive school dental health education programs which includes the following: Periodic Oral health education using various health education aids. Free distribution and Supervised toothbrushing technique along with demonstration on models. Atraumatic Restorative technique is followed in remote areas and camp sites where sophisticated equipment is not available. Anti-tobacco Counseling is provided. The department of public health dentistry conducts dental camps. regularly in collaboration with BAWA Foundation, Karnataka Cancer Society, Tibetan youth association, Lions club, Rotary club, e.t.c List of dental camps which includes a blood donation camp and oral health promotion is available in college. Dental camps are conducted in rural areas as well. Counselling of patients is carried out against tobacco and smoking habits. Camps are also conducted in collaboration with Rotaract and Lion's Club of Bangalore. The institution is associated with the Danta Bhagya Yojana Scheme by the State Government to deliver free complete dentures to senior citizens with BPL cards from Doddaballapur. An anti-ragging workshop was held for students in our premises on March 2nd 2016 by the DCI member Dr Shiv Sharan Shetty. The institution is a member of the Indian Red Cross Society.

The institution promote university-neighborhood network and student engagement, contributing to the holistic development of students and sustained community development


- The Departments of Public Health Dentistry have conducted more than 250 camps wherein screening, oral health education and treatment if possible were provided in and around Bangalore.

their internal assessment marks to their respective mentors. The students who require counseling are identified and appropriate measures are taken to help the students to overcome their difficulties.

DAY CARE FACILITY - DAY CARE FACILITY for the patient's children is present in the pediatric dentistry department so that the patients can get their treatment done without worrying about their children. This creates a safe and secure environment for the children while their parents are getting their treatment done.

# 7.1.4 Describe the facilities in the Institution for the management of the following types of degradable and non-degradable waste (within 100 - 200 words)

Sri Rajiv Gandhi college of dental sciences has designed methods for the management of waste generated in the campus using the basic waste management strategy of **3R's: Reduce**, **Reuse and Recycle** i.e., Reduce the amount of waste generated, Reuse everything to its maximum after proper segregation and cleaning and keeping things which can be Recycled aside and handed over to appropriate agencies.

The waste generated in the college includes liquid waste and solid waste- both of biodegradable and non-biodegradable nature & chemical waste. No classified hazardous waste is generated in the college. The environmental policy of the institute is to achieve zero discharge and complete utilization of waste with well-designed strategies to make the college clean, hygienic and healthy.

Hospital bio-medical waste management policy is in compliance with Karnataka state pollution control board

In Sri Rajiv Gandhi college of dental sciences, Biomedical waste is managed according to its type and characteristics. For waste management to be effective, the waste is managed at every step, from acquisition to disposal. The following are the elements of our comprehensive waste management system: waste survey, segregation, accumulation and storage, transportation, treatment, disposal and also waste minimization.

**Waste survey** In the survey we differentiate and quantify the waste generated. To determine the points of generation, the type of waste at each point and the level of generation and disinfection within the dental hospital. This helps to determine the method of disposal.

#### Waste segregation

Waste segregation in our college consists of placing different kinds of wastes in different containers or coded bags at the point of generation. It helps to reduce the bulk of infectious waste as well as treatment costs. Segregation also helps to contain the spread of infection and reduces the chances of infecting other health care workers.



### Waste accumulation and storage

Waste accumulation and storage occurs between the point of waste generation and site of waste treatment and disposal. While accumulation refers to the temporary holding of small quantities of waste near the point of generation, storage of waste is characterized by longer holding periods and large waste quantity.

Waste transportation

The medical waste is transported from our college generation facility to another site through MEDICARE PVT LTD (GOVT of KARNATAKA) for treatment and disposal.

Waste treatment

Waste treatment is mainly required to disinfect or decontaminate the waste, right at source so that it is no longer the source of pathogenic organisms. After such treatment, the residue can be handled safely, transported and stored.

- Needles and syringe nozzle shredded in needle destroyer and syringe cutters
- Scalpel blades/ Lancet/ Broken glass are put in separate containers with bleach, transferred to plastic/ cardboard boxes; sealed to prevent spillage and transported to incubators
- Glassware is disinfected, cleaned and sterilized

- Culture plates with viable culture should be autoclaved; media are placed in appropriate bags and disposed of. The plates are reused after sterilization
- Gloves are shredded / cut / mutilated before disposal.
- Swabs are chemically disinfected followed by incineration. If they contain only a small amount of blood that does not drip, they can be placed in the garbage.
- Disposable items are often recycled and have the risk of being used illegally. Dipping in freshly prepared 1% sodium hypochlorite for 30 min. one hour, followed by mutilation before disposal should be the policy adopted for such items.
- Liquid waste generated by the laboratory is either pathological or chemical in nature. Non-infectious wastes are neutralized with reagents.
- Liquid infectious waste are treated with a chemical disinfectant for contamination and then neutralized.

Waste disposal

Waste disposal is through an organized facility provided by Medicare Pvt limited on everyday basis. Waste disposal during dental camps is through burial, and landfills.

**Waste** minimization

All measures are being undertaken to decrease the amount of infectious waste generated which will simultaneously decrease the cost of infectious waste disposal

### 7.1.5 Water conservation facilities available in the Institution:

### 1. Rain Water Harvesting

In Sri Rajiv Gandhi Dental College rain water harvesting system was incorporated in the architecture plan and has been installed in the college building. It is located behind the girl's hostel, it is 15 feet deep well. The water from rooftops and floors is collected through down pipes and discharged in the ground as well as in recharge pits near borewell through pipe lines in the campus.



### Bore well/open well recharge

The college campus has 3 borewells which pumps the water from underground and supplies to the dental college, engineering college, nursing college, girl's hostel and boy's hostel. The borewell is located near the canteen.



### 2. Construction of tanks and bunds

A tank of capacity 2.5 L litres is built to supply water to the dental college, engineering college, nursing college, girl's hostel and boy's hostel. It is located outside the girl's hostel. Water bunds are built to capture the rain water and it is conserved. 3 water bunds are present in the campus. 1<sup>st</sup> near the dental college, 2<sup>nd</sup> near the engineering college and 3<sup>rd</sup> near the two wheeler parking area.





### 3. Waste water recycling

The college is working on waste water recycling project and it would soon be ready.

### 4. Maintenance of water bodies and distribution system in the campus

The campus has 6 over head tanks. The overhead tanks are located in the new dental block, old dental block and in the girl's hostel.

### 7.1.6 Green campus initiatives of the Institution include:

### 1. Restricted entry of automobiles

There is a restriction for entry of automobiles inside the campus. Staff and students are issued vehicle pass for entry inside the campus and visitors or patients entering inside the campus must report to the security and make an entry in the visitor's book.



### 2. Battery powered vehicles

The college encourages the staff and students to use battery powered vehicles to reduce pollution. At present there is only one battery powered vehicle in the campus.



### 3. Pedestrian friendly pathways

There are many pedestrian pathways in the campus for the students and the patients to walk. The pathways are present from the office till the dental block and also from the dental block till the canteen connecting to the parking place. Pedestrian pathways are also present in the engineering college block.



### 4. Ban on use of plastic

Campus is a plastic free zone all measures have been taken to ban the use of plastic. Dust bins have been placed at most of the places like the canteen and parking place. Our college strongly believes in reuse, reduce and recycle.



### 5. Landscaping with trees and plants





### **PROPOSAL**

To provide counseling to differently abled students.

To assess the educational needs of differently abled persons enrolled in the higher education

Institutes to determine the types of assistive devices to be procured

To conduct awareness programmes for teachers of the institute about the approaches to teaching, Evaluation procedures, etc, which they should address in the case of differently-abled students.

To celebrate important days pertaining to disability such as the World Disabled Day, White Cane Day, etc., in the institute in order to create awareness about the capabilities of differently-abled Persons.

#### **Toilets**

There shall be separate toilets for people with disabilities. At-least one such toilet on every floor shall be provided. The number must be increased if the floor is large or has high occupancy

Vertical and horizontal handrails with 2 inches clearance from wall must be provided inside

Toilets. A call alarm switch shall be installed in these toilets to call for help, if required. The switch shall be close to ground level

#### OTHER CONSIDERATIONS

- 1. The flooring of the areas that are accessed by public shall be made up of non-slippery materials.
- 2. Sufficient seating provision shall be made at waiting areas. Reserved seating for people with disabilities shall be provided. These seats shall be firm and shall allow for the person to easily stand from it.
- 3. Sufficient space shall be provided in-front of drinking water equipment. The height of tap Shall be accessible for wheelchair bound patient.
- 4. Dedicated parking space for people with disabilities shall be provided. These parking spots shall be as near to the entrance as possible.

Duration of courses: The undergraduate dental training program (B.D.S. degree) will be four years duration in addition to 1-year compulsory rotating internship and Postgraduate training (MDS) programme for 3 yrs.

- 1. The student must strictly follow the disciplinary rules and regulations of the Institution.

  Any act of indiscipline or misbehaviour by any student will attract severe punishment.
- 2. The student should follow the academic calendar and the curriculum recommended by the university.
- 3. Students are expected to dress neatly and wear a white coat. White coat (apron) denotes professionalism, responsibility, duty, honour and compassion. Jeans or any kind of casual dress is not allowed within campus.
- 4. Students must set high standards of respect and mannerism within the premises of college, to revere and treat each other in a professional and courteous manner.
- 5. Be attentive, fair and cooperative to teachers and peers on various academic and non-academic activities
- 6. The student should switch off their mobile phones while in the classroom, laboratory, clinics, library etc.
- 7. Undergraduate student should have atleast 80% of attendance in theory and practical clinics of each subject separately in each year and 100% overall performance.

- 8. A postgraduate should work in the concerned department of the Institution for a full period of 3 years as a resident.
- 9. Post graduate student should have 80% attendance (250 days) for each year of the course separately.
- 10. Absence due to health issues must be reported with medical certificate and the medical leave should comply within the 20% of the permissible leave
- 11. The internal assessment examinations for undergraduate students in theory and practical/clinical will be held twice in a particular year followed by a model examination in the pattern of university examination.
- 12. The undergraduate student should secure at least 40% of the maximum marks in internal assessment for both theory and practical/clinical in all subjects/papers, separately to be eligible, to appear for the University examination

### CODE OF CONDUCT FOR THE PRINCIPAL

  - f. Staff shall get casual leaves, medical leaves and annual leaves as per Rules of the college issued-by the authorities and university.


# 7.1.10 The Institution celebrates/ organizes national and international commemorative days, events and festivals

### **Implant training programme**

#### 1. Objectives of the Practice:

- 1. To provide basic training in oral implantology for interns and teaching faculty.
- 2. To impart working knowledge regarding case selection, treatment planning and execution of routine implant cases in dental OPD
- 3. To give hands-on clinical training in implant placement and prosthetic rehabiltaion.
- 4. To encourage interns and teaching faculty to take up implant cases and inspire them to acquire better clinical skills in handling implant cases
- 5. To identify candidates with interest and clinical skill to further train them in advanced implant related procedures.

6. To instill confidence in identifying, convincing and performing implant treatment after the candidate passes out of the institution

#### **Title of Practice 2:**

#### **Tobacco Cessation clinic.**

### 1. The objective of the Practice:

- o To Recognize the various patterns, biology and epidemiology in our area.
- o To increase awareness and intention to quit among tobacco users.
- o Emphasize Consequences of tobacco use and health benefits of tobacco Cessation

India has over 275 million current tobacco users. Tobacco cessation is the only way to save the current tobacco users from tobacco-related mortality.

With our observation, in our outpatients 25-30% were using tobacco in some form or other the major group who were using tobacco were in the group of 13-35 years.

With this in mind, two separate programs were started to identify the real need among the surrounding villages. NSS and Department of Public health Dentistry jointly organize school camps to create awareness among students who will be in a better position to inculcate the message and transform their family members.

- o Regular counselling and collaborative camps with Bangalore Baptist hospital cancer centre and KMIU are being done to address the issue. Nearly fifty to sixty percent of patients have acknowledged their habits and want to lead a happy life.
- o Tobacco as a menace cannot be handled by a single institution alone it should be an unified collaborative effort.
- O More personnel should be trained in this sphere of work. Other than technical staff, doctors should be trained for tobacco Cessation on a larger scale.

## 8.1.2 The Institution ensures adequate training for students in pre-clinical skills

Describe the steps taken to improve pre-clinical skills along with details of facilities available for students such as pre-clinical skill labs

## PRE CLINICAL SKILLS

- The respective departments provide the students with the specific course objectives at the beginning of academic session. The schedule of the preclinical exercises, tests, internal assessment examinations is also given at the commencement of the session.
- The effectiveness of the process is ensured by conducting the formative assessment exams. The preclinical work module is subdivided into smaller units to ensure proper learning in small groups. Special classes/tutorials and additional training measure like self and peer assisted learning measures are taken. Individual training during Preclinical/ clinical hours for needy students is given.
- Compensatory demonstrations and clinical postings are given for students who remain absent for regular classes on medical reasons for long duration.
- Predecided topics are given to students, divided into groups of 3 to 5
  members, encouraged and motivated to do group discussions and later cross
  group discussions during which any doubts and difficulties faced by student
  are solved by the facilitator.
- Clinical demonstration videos and hand-outs of classes are given to students.
   The preclinical work is also taught to them. The students collect material and read about a particular preclinical exercise from the latest books and journals and e- library.
- We ask the students to make projects on anatomical landmarks. We keep MCQ's
  to improvize their skills and also we conduct internal exams with alloted timings.

Students are taught manipulation of dental materials so that they correlate the same in the clinical environment.

The college adapts both objective and conventional evaluations methods to assess theattainment of dental attributes. The objective methods like OSPE/OSCE are introduced for evaluation of student wherein the students' depths of knowledge, clinical skills, communication skills etc. are assessed. The conventional evaluation system includes answering the set of questions, one on one viva-Voce, identification of displayed specimens in a specified time limit, Chair side viva, Case presentation and pedagogy.
